

## **Program Evaluation**

Watershed literacy

90% of students score 85% or higher on UM Watershed Literacy Instrument after MWEE

... measure what is not directly measurable

Dangerous!!!! Who will use indicator & how (not as intended)?

Process - goal??? Is it really?

Outcomes - good to think about these too!


### **Levels:**

### **Indicators: Characteristics**

- Measurable
- Relevant (valid + reliable)
  - **❖** Is it appropriate measure
  - use more than one indicator
- Manageable (data available, not too many)
- Easily understood
- Not binary (to document progress)
- **❖** Achievable/reachable
- **❖** Meaningful/important sufficiently ambitious
- **❖** Timely
- Have targets

Think of: # & characteristics (who, what, when, where)

# Indicators: Must be considered legitimate/be accepted!

### <u>Process</u> ~ <u>Guidelines</u>

Literature review – what measures have been used?
e.g. Guidelines, NOAA B-WET evaluation (in process)

Involve target users in development, testing, revision

# Indicators: Must be used!

### Process ~ Guidelines

Support use! (i.e., behavior change & maintenance)

### **Evaluation's Political Nature**

"Evaluation is NOT political under the following conditions:

No one cares about the program

No one knows about the program

No money is at stake

No power or authority is at stake

And no one in the program, making decisions about the program, or otherwise involved in knowledgeable about, or attached to the program is sexually active."
